Overview: In the Chapter 3, Level 1A students will discuss Summary

In this unit, students will ask about and describe people, ask for and give opinions, identify family members, and ask about family members. Students will also conjugate the verb "être", discuss adjective formation, agreement, and irregular adjectives, form possessive adjectives, and form contractions with de. Unit 3 will start during the second marking period, and continue into the third marking period.

This instruction must include science, social studies and technology, as well as College and Career readiness, by utilizing the NJ Student Learning Standards as mandated by the New Jersey Department of Education.

Technology is integrated into instruction in meaningful ways. Students and teachers use digital tools and information to solve problems individually and collaboratively to create and communicate knowledge. Resources and activities found on the Technology Resource Page provide a variety of differentiated learning opportunities to meet the needs of individual students. Activities range in levels outside of grade level to meet the academic needs and learning styles of all students.

All lessons are differentiated to accommodate classified, ESL, and advanced students.

Accommodations/modifications as per IEP and 504 Plans will be implemented. Enrichment activities designed to challenge the more advanced students include independent study and project-based learning through active exploration of real-world challenges and problems. These activities are detailed in the Teachers' Editions.

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Modifications for Special Education / 504

Students with special needs: The students' needs will be addressed on an individual and grade level using a variety of modalities. Accommodations will be made for those students who need extra time to complete assignment. Teacher will be available to aid students related to IEP specifications. 504 accommodations will also be attended to by all instructional leaders. Expectations and modifications, alternative assessments, and scaffolding strategies will be used to support this learning. The use of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) will be considered for all students as teaching strategies are considered. Students will be provided with accommodations and modifications that may include:

- Small group instruction
- Modeling and guided practice
- Read directions aloud
- Repeat, rephrase and clarify directions
- Extended time as needed
- Break down assignments into smaller units
- Provide shortened assignments
- Modify testing format
- Repeat directions as needed
- Graphic organizers
- Sentence Starters
- Manipulatives
- Pictures, photographs
- Word Wall
- Project Based Learning

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Modifications for At-Risk Students

Formative and summative data will be used to monitor student success. At first signs of failure, student work will be reviewed to determine support. This may include parent consultation, basic skills review and differentiation strategies. With considerations to UDL, time may be a factor in overcoming developmental considerations. More time will be made available with a certified instructor to aid students in reaching the standards.
