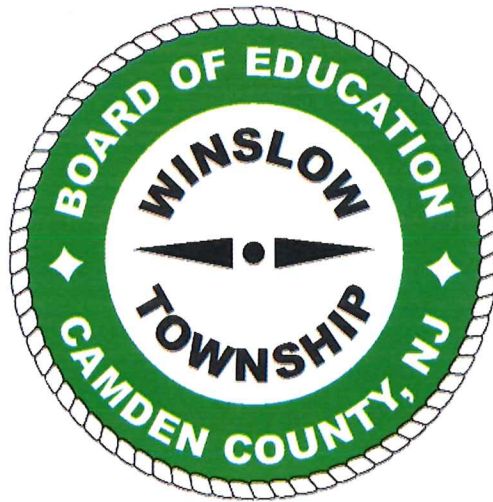

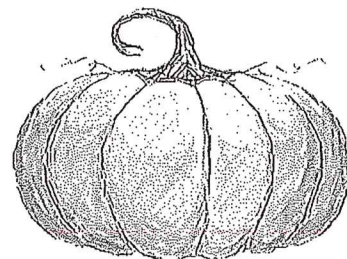

Week of Respect

October 6-10, 2025, was the Annual Week of Respect. The school counselor, Mrs. Duca, spent the week delivering individual class lessons throughout the school to increase student awareness. This week is a part of the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights that became effective September 1, 2011. Each classroom was read a book or watched a video that ties into the theme of Respect:

- Pre-school listened to “Jungle Bullies” by Steven Kroll. This story follows a chain reaction of bullying among jungle animals, starting with Elephant intimidating Hippo, who then bullies Lion, and so on, until Monkey’s mother teaches him to stand up for himself, leading to a resolution where the animals learn to share and cooperate. The message for students is that it makes for a more positive environment if we work together, share, and show respect. After the story, the students were given a booklet to color that shows the different ways they can share with friends.
- Kindergarten read the book “We’re All Wonders” by R.J. Palacio. The book features Auggie, the main character from Wonder, and his dog Daisy on a journey that emphasizes empathy, kindness, the idea that everyone is a unique “wonder” deserving of compassion, and encourages children to see the wonder in themselves and others, promoting acceptance and belonging. Auggie helps show kids that we should always be proud of the things that make us different and unique. After the story, the students wrote a paper titled “I Am A Wonder” where they can draw themselves wearing the same space helmet Auggie does in the story.
- Students read the book “Taste Your Words” by Bonnie Clark. This story follows a girl named Amera who learns the power of her words by “tasting” them, discovering that mean words taste bad (like rotten eggs) while kind words taste sweet. The book helps teach young children about kindness and the importance of thinking before they speak. The students then were able to write down the kind and caring words they like to use with others and what they “taste” like (i.e. The word “please” tastes like a cherry lollipop.)
- Second grade read a story called “The Sandwich Swap” by Queen Rania Al Adbullah and Kelly DiPucchio. This story follows best friends Lily and Salma, who initially dislike each other’s lunches—peanut butter and jelly versus hummus—leading to a food fight and a rift in their friendship. In figuring out how to respect each other’s differences, the book helps to promote themes of tolerance, acceptance, and the power of friendship over differences. The students then completed their own Sandwich Swap lunch plate, where they completed sentences like “Differences are cool because...” and “I can understand others by...”.
- Third grade students read a book called “Better than You” by Trudy Ludwig. The story follows Tyler as he deals with his friend Jake’s constant bragging about how much better he is at everything, from sports to schoolwork. This leaves Tyler feeling inadequate and damages their friendship. The boys have to figure out a way to celebrate their own accomplishments while also respecting the skills and abilities of each other. After the story, students completed sentences to show ways to be a good friend and behaviors to avoid. They also had the opportunity to showcase/highlight some things they do really well and listen to the accomplishments of their classmates.

Professional Development: Teachers participated in professional development on October 7, 2025.

Red Ribbon Week: School #4 students participated in Red Ribbon Week during October 27, 2025 – October 31, 2025. Our school focus was on violence prevention awareness and promoting positive character. The students were encouraged to participate in themed days during the week to reinforce the message.

Vocabulary Parade: On October 9th, students had the opportunity to participate in this academic dress-up event while focusing on vocabulary words to describe their choice of costume. Students, teachers, and guests enjoyed the event.

Home and School Association: Fundraisers to support planned student activities are under way. Our first Book Fair was a success and families enjoyed attending the family night.

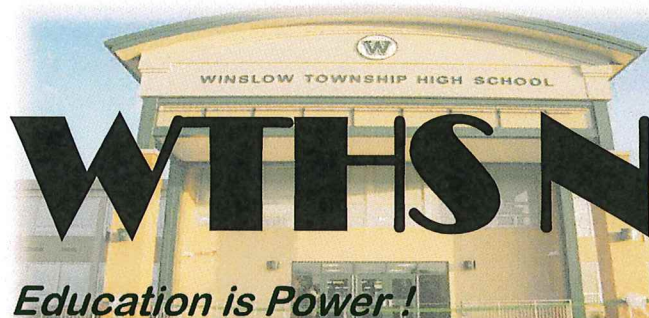
- October 3rd – International Day of the Girl was observed through STEM activities held as 5 rotations stations in the cafeteria

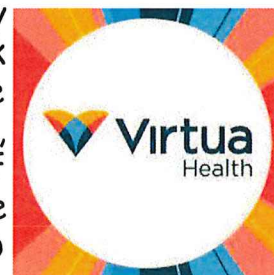

Nurse's Corner



The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness. Most experts believe that flu viruses spread by droplets expelled when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has the flu virus on it and then touching their own mouths, eyes, or noses. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children, and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year. People who have the flu often feel some or all these signs and symptoms:

- * Fever* or feeling feverish/chills
- * Cough
- * Sore throat
- * Runny or stuffy nose
- * Muscle or body aches
- * Headaches
- * Fatigue (very tired)
- * Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

*It is important to note that not everyone with the flu will have a fever.
