School Violence Awareness Week...

October 20-24, 2014, was School Violence Awareness Week. School #4 counselor, Mrs. Duca, visited all classrooms to talk about bullying, harassment, and intimidation. She emphasized the role that students play in making our school a safe place to be.

Week of Respect

October 6-10, 2014, was the Annual Week of Respect. The school counselor, Mrs. Duca, spent the week delivering individual class lessons throughout the school to increase student awareness. Each classroom was read a book that ties into the theme of Respect.

Pre-K/Kindergarten - It's Okay to Be Different - The theme of this lesson was to be kind to each other despite any differences/disabilities. After reading the story together, the children discussed what makes them special. They then drew a self portrait, emphasizing all of their unique traits.

1st Grade - The Crayon Box that Talked - The students in first grade were introduced to this story through a hands-on drawing activity. They first drew a picture using only one color, and then were able to draw a picture with any color they wanted. Then, after watching a short video of the story, they were able to compare their drawings. The students realized that they liked the picture better that was more colorful. The message of this lesson was that, just like the crayons in the story, we create a much better picture when we work together as a team.

2nd Grade - Do Unto Otters - Second graders were reintroduced to the idea of "The Golden Rule". They read the book and then went over the different positives behaviors that they would like to receive and display towards others. These were such things as: kindness, cooperation, forgiveness, etc.

With Signature, Mrs. Taylor, encourages everyone to be aware that fluseason is beginning and work towards prevention. She defines it as "accontagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs, it can cause mild to severe illness." As such, she recommends getting a fluvaccine every year as the best practice for prevention. Symptoms of fluinclude some or all of the following: fever or feeling feverish/chills, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headaches and vomiting and diarrhea, especially in children. Mrs. Taylor warns that not everyone with the flu will have a fever. Since fluviruses are spread via coming into contact with droplets made when people with flucough, sneeze or talk, it is important to stay away from sick people, stay home if sick, wipe down surfaces with Clorox, refrain from touching own mouth, eyes or nose without washing hands, and wash hands thoroughly. Students and adults can be contagious from day one and up to five to seven days after symptoms subside. Thus, it is integral to stay home from school twenty-four hours after being fever free. Good nutrition, sleep, exercise and proper hydration are the key elements to a speedy recovery.
